Psalm 46:10

Friends,

This is one of my most favorite scriptures. Why? Because when I am at my busiest, running in circles, forgetting half the things I have set myself to do, the only way I justify slowing down and regrouping is by taking time to repeat this scripture. In so doing, a calmness takes over my being, and I begin to look around and see what is real, necessary, worthy of being a priority, *and*, what God would have me be doing, especially since most of the things we do and expend energy on, may not be what God would have us doing anyway.

I wonder if that first Easter morning might have turned out differently as far as how the news was received, and how everything unfolded, just as Jesus said it would – if Mary had taken some time on that first Easter morning, when everything seemed to have been turned upside-down, would she have recognized Jesus before he called her name; if Peter and John had acknowledged the truth of the empty tomb before running back and locking themselves in the Upper Room. Of course life is full of “what ifs” and we do have the advantage of witness in the scriptures, or “the rest of the story.” When we allow God into our space, especially during times of confusion and chaos, God has a way of revealing to us what is real and true, and things work out as they should, if we are taking the time to be still and listen. It was in the naming that Mary saw and understood; when the risen Christ appeared among the disciples locked behind the doors, they began to believe.

Maybe when I am still, looking and listening for God, it is in God’s calling to me that I am brought into the reality of the moment. In that stillness I also find new strength and hope, an inner renewal, and time given to inner renewal is never wasted. In fact, it is the fuel for our journey, and more importantly, it is the discipline that helps to shape our very being.

During this Easter season, when we are surrounded by new life, new birth, the glory and wonder of re-creation, take time to *be still, and know....* *Debbie*

EASTER: THE GREAT FIFTY DAYS

What Easter celebrates is far too important to be confined to one day. So its message of joy is extended across 50 days, including 8 Sundays; the first Sunday we call Easter Day and the final Sunday we know as the Day of Pentecost.

In the ancient church, both fasting and kneeling were forbidden during this time, as they were considered inappropriate to the Easter season, and alleluias (banished from ancient liturgy throughout Lent) abounded, as they do today in our Easter hymns. The 6 stanzas of Charles Wesley's Christ the Lord Is Risen Today contains two dozen alleluias!

The Gospels make clear that the Resurrection of Jesus is no mere resuscitation, such as he had given to Lazarus and the daughter of Jairus, and the son of the widow of Nain, all of whom had to die again; nor is the Resurrection a ghostly manifestation. Furthermore, it is not some psychological trick of wish fulfillment, as our current culture may be inclined to believe. The Resurrection is the manifestation of a new kind, and quality of life, which we have no words to describe. If we think that we can understand it, we do not understand it at all. For Resurrection is the sublime, mysterious gift of God, which we are to experience as both astounding and transforming.

Ascension Day, the 40th day of the Easter season, we witness the risen Christ, freed from the limitations of time and space, taken on at Bethlehem. The day of Pentecost, the 50th and final day of the Easter season, is the result of the power of the Resurrection, mediated by the Holy Spirit, and is what establishes, and motivates the mission of what we know as church. This day of celebration we often refer to as the Birthday of the Church, and acknowledge the gifts the Spirit has given us to do the work of the Church. This is also the appropriate time for the confirmands who have been preparing for baptism and/or church membership to be received into the fellowship, and any others wishing to join the church; a great day of celebration!

Church and Society Committee Environmental Tip # 58

All of Hampton Roads, the Peninsula, Middle Peninsula, Northern Neck, and coastal North Carolina have always been prone to flooding and erosion. As our planet continues to warm and glacial ice in the polar regions continues to melt causing sea levels to rise, we in Gloucester County have good reason to be concerned. Mean high tide is about a foot higher than it was in 1938, when most cities and counties started setting building codes requiring new houses to be built at specific heights above sea level. Built in 1968, our house had to be 7 feet above sea level, but when we lost it to Hurricane Isabelle our new house had to be at least 7 ½ feet above sea level. We built a bit higher than that. So much of the county is only a few feet above sea level and close to rivers and marshes that we can expect some properties will eventually be unbuildable or completely lost to the waters.

Just about everyone has heard the quote from "The Rime of the Ancient Mariner" "...water, water, everywhere nor any drop to drink." You don't want to be at sea without any fresh water. In fact you don't want to be anywhere without fresh water. With any severe flooding event the first supplies brought in always include water as the normal water supply may be contaminated. In Gloucester many homeowners depend on shallow wells that draw water from the ground water in the water table rather than the deep Potomac aquifer. These wells can be threatened by drought or suffer salt water incursion or contamination during flooding. In our whole region military installations have stored and buried hazardous waste since the time before anyone knew what was hazardous. Fly ash, emissions and waste water from power production, manufacturing and agriculture have historically and are presently discharged into our streams, waterways, and air. Flood waters disturb the soil, cause water and sewer treatment facilities to overflow, and breach settling ponds used to contain and treat agricultural and manufacturing waste. And we individually have long used pesticides and fertilizers on our properties and disposed of all sorts of trash improperly. If we could thoroughly search every inch of our county, do you think we could find 1000 discarded car batteries half buried or thrown in a heap in the woods? Do you think we could find 1000 old tires or places where 1000 quarts of old oil were poured? We could probably find barrels of old oil, paint and chemicals. When flood waters recede wells can usually be flushed and treated successfully but some things can't be easily cleaned. Look at Flint, Michigan. Instead of buying water from other cities (like cities around here buy from Newport News) the local leaders decided to save money by getting their public water supply from the Flint River without a thorough analysis of the water. And the cost will be young children with varying levels of lead poisoning; a clean-up that may require replacing all water pipes in the public water system and the pipes in each house using the system; and a price tag of possibly tens of millions. It will require help from the state and federal governments and all taxpayers.

Since we have been warned repeatedly that tides will continue to rise and flooding will be more extreme, we need to make sure we know what contaminants could threaten our water, what local water tests are indicating and make sure our local leaders are preparing for the county's future needs. And what could each of us do? April 22nd is Earth Day. Wouldn't it be great if each of us did 2 things to

conserve water this month and found 2 more things to recycle or properly discard in honor of Earth Day?
